ennifer Carroll became the first recipient of the Arthur Furst Undergraduate Scholarship on October 9, 1995. She's a senior chemistry major at the University of San Francisco (USF) in California. The scholarship, endowed by Golden Neo-Life Diamite International in honor of Distinguished University Professor Emeritus and Scientific Advisory Board Senior Member Dr. Arthur Furst, is awarded annually by the USF Dean of Arts and Sciences to an undergraduate science major demonstrating outstanding academic ability and a strong desire to pursue research.

"Beginning her senior year as a chemistry major, Jennifer's cumulative grade point average stands presently at 3.765. This includes many of the 'GPA-buster' courses such as genetics and physical chemistry."

"Jennifer is continuing her work in the research laboratory of Professor of Chemistry John Cobley. Here she is investigating genetic changes in the bacterium Fremyella diplosiphon. And that effort, in turn, is directed toward a better understanding of what turns certain genes 'on' or 'off.' Interestingly, the work is being undertaken in a laboratory which once was a focal point for Professor Arthur Furst's own classic work in toxicology. Professor Cobley speaks highly of Jennifer's work in his laboratory and particularly cites her intelligence, enthusiasm, and her persistence as key ingredients in her research success. These personal traits are, as we all recognize, essential to a research career."




Not Just Any Undergrad
